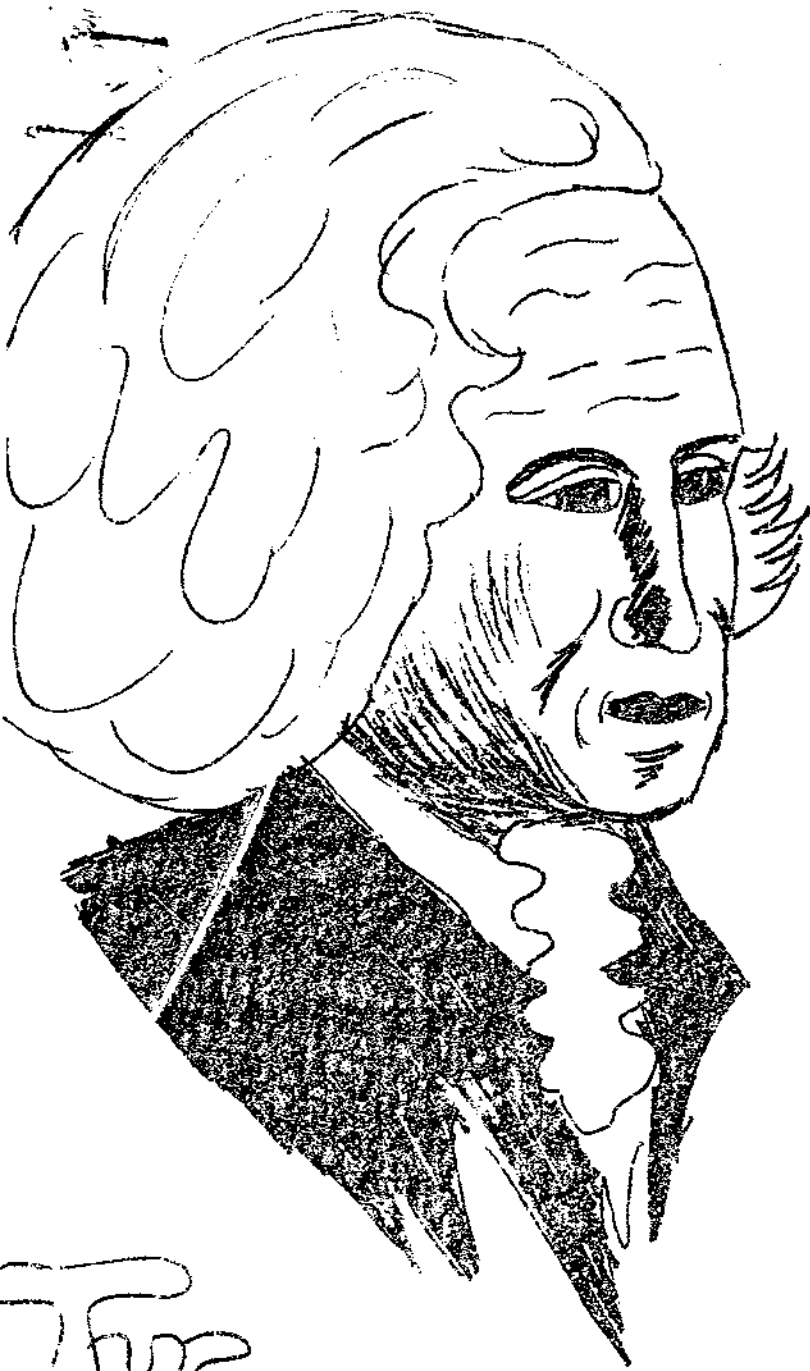

## Diamonds

Diamonds are a very expensive type of gem. There are many different types but there are only two important ones. They are the industrial type and the gem type.

Made of carbon, diamonds are the hardest substances known and are the rarest known. Diamonds aren't only useful as abrasives but are also desirable as gems.

Diamond grains can cut any other known substance. It can be used in dies and in forming tools.

Before a diamond can be used as a gem, it must be clear with no flaws and generally colorless. This type of diamonds is more rare than industrial types.

When a gem diamond is cut, it is to produce a set of flat faces. The angles between these faces are measured precisely. The way the faces are cut are reasons diamonds sparkle and glitter.

The value of a diamond depends on how exact it has been cut and polished, the lack of flaws it has, and the size. It is measured by weight in carats. One carat equals two tenths of a gram, or 1/500 g. Most diamonds weigh less than one carat.

## KILLING IN GOOD TASTE

Washington D.C.--Army recruits will no longer be taught to shout "Kill! Kill!" as they charge the enemy in bayonet training. The latest hand-to-hand combat manuals specially state that the "shouting of indiscreet slogans or responses is not permitted" and they even suggest bayonet thrusts that are merely "instinctive" rather than carefully aimed at some vital part of the body. According to an Army training specialist at Fort Monroe, Virginia, "We're trying to keep things modern and in good taste."

## CONGRESSIONAL IMMUNITY

During a Senate debate on extending the draft, Sen. William Saxbe of Ohio reported that members of the U.S. Congress have some 230 draft-eligible sons, but over half were "waivered out for one reason or another" and only 26 have been sent to Vietnam.

Saxbe did not accuse his fellow Congressmen of using influence to keep their sons out of the military or out of the war but said that such figures prove Selective Service, with its present system of deferments, is too selective and favors upper-income groups.

## KNOW YOUR SCHOOL

These are the official statistics for the Maries R-1 School District. The school is located in Vienna, ZIP Code 65582, and the official name for the school district is Maries R-1. The school's telephone number is 314-422-3306.

The district's assessed valuation is \$4,314,337, which is slightly below the average for a school district in this state. The tax levy is 13.08 per \$100 of assessed valuation, which is one of the lowest tax levies in the entire state.

Now for the enumeration figures. In the elementary, which comprises Kindergarten, and grades 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, and 6, there are 19 teachers and 368 students. In Junior High, which is grades 7 and 8, there are 5 teachers and 157 students. In high school, grades 9, 10, 11, and 12, there are 21 teachers and 285 students. This makes a total of 45 teachers and 806 students for 13 grades.

The president of the Maries R-1 school board is Paul Jake, and his secretary is Priscilla Byrd. The superintendent is Jack Allen, who has been working in the school system for 42 years. His 42-year length of service is one of the longest in the entire state of Missouri. His secretary is Priscilla Byrd, who has been in the school system for 10 years. ## RANCHING IN MARSH COUNTY.

Although today is an age of automation and mechanization, manual labor is far from extinct. I was employed by the Thompson Angus Ranch located five miles south on Paydown Road. The Ranch deals mainly in raising registered Aberdeen Angus cattle. The ranch runs approximately 2,000 head of cattle which means a lot of work for the hired help. The ranch keeps about six employees in the winter, and in the summer months they usually hire three or four more, usually high school or college boys. Most of the work is during the summer months. Summer is when the food crops such as hay and grain are grown to feed the cattle during the summer months. As anyone knows, putting up hay is pretty low manual labor, and it takes a lot of hay to feed 2,000 head of cattle. On the average it takes 100 bales of hay to feed one cow during the winter, so you can figure it out for yourself. Last summer the ranch acquired a new means for harvesting hay. They purchased a New Holland Stak-Hand. This machine makes huge 4-ton stacks of compressed hay and are then hauled to the site where they are to be fed. This makes hay hauling much easier, but there are places where the terrain will not allow its use, so there is still plenty of work for the laborers. Among other jobs there is fence building and repair, and driving a post in Missouri soil is not exactly a pleasant undertaking. Other chores involved in the running of a ranch are digging water lines, building new pens, transporting and giving medication to the cattle. Ranching is an endless job with no holidays or days off, because no matter what the occasion or holiday is, the cattle still have to eat. It's a job that lasts 365 days a year and most of the work is not very pleasant. But more than 15,000,000 people today are involved with agriculture so there must be some reward in it.



## BOY'S SPORTS EAGLES CLIP ST. ELIZABETH

In a thrilling action-packed cliffhanger played Friday night, January 10, the Vienna Eagles edged out the St. Elizabeth Hornets 62-56, in an OMC Conference contest. The B team easily won its game, 41-28.

The A game was close the entire game, with neither team getting more than four points ahead of the other, and Vienna holding a slim lead most of the time. In the first quarter, neither team was able to go very far ahead and at the end of the quarter, the score was tied 12-12. Each team kept pace with the other in the second quarter, 18-19, making the halftime score a 30-30-tie. The Eagles had their difficulties with the rough scrappy Hornets in the third period as they were outscored 11-13 and went down to a 45-43 deficit after three periods. However, the Eagles soared back and overtook the Hornets in the fourth quarter, when sophomore Rusty Snodgrass came off the bench to score 7 points in that period to help spark the Eagles to a 19-11 outscoring of the Hornets, enough to give them a 62-56 victory. Tommy Williams paced Vienna with 17 points, followed by Dave Fick with 13 and Roger Bullock with 10. Lawrence Holtmeyer led St. Elizabeth with 18 points, followed by Gary Hake's 16, and Larry Hake's 12. This is the Eagles' fourth straight victory since their loss to powerhouse Tusculum on December 17, and it raises their overall record to 8-7, the first time they have had a winning record since November 16. Their OMC Conference record is 7-1, with their only loss to unbeaten Tusculum. The Eagles next game will be an OMC Conference contest with the Eugene Eagles in Vienna on Tuesday night, January 18. In a previous contest in the OMC conference tournament, Vienna beat Eugene 51-27.

The B team cruised to a fairly easy victory, but not until after some hassling. The Hornets kept the game close in the first quarter, when both teams scored 4 points.

However, the Eagles came on with a press in the second quarter, and pounded the Hornets with 17 points, while allowing only 3, to take a 21-7 halftime advantage. The Eagles gained another point in the third quarter 9-8, and slipped two points in the fourth quarter 11-13, but the second half had many substitutions and the B team held on for a 41-28 win. This win raises the B team's record to 6-3, and their conference record to 3-1. This is also the B team's fourth straight win since losing to Tusculum's B team, and now the AGB teams have won 8 consecutive games.

### EAGLES RIDDLED JUICE

Wednesday night, January 12, the Vienna Eagles traveled to Blair Oaks with the Freshman and Junior High teams to do battle with the Falcons. It was not a good night for the Eagles as they dropped both contests, the freshmen losing 30-28, and the junior high bowing 40-20.

In the freshman game, the Eagles kept it close through the first half, as they were outpointed 7-6 in the first quarter and kept a 10-10 pace in the second quarter, for a 1-point 17-16 deficit at the half. However, the Eagles fell apart in the third quarter, as the Falcons outscored them 10-2, to make the score 27-18 after three periods. A late rally by the Eagles failed to upend the Falcons and they went down to a 30-28 defeat. Jim Fuller led Vienna's scoring with 8 points, while high-scoring Mickey Byrd was held to 2 points.

The Eagles go behind in the junior high battle early, as they were outscored 11-5 in the first quarter and 18-2 in the second quarter to go 19 points down at the half, 26-7. In the third quarter, the Vienna team was again outscored by Blair Oaks, 12-8, making it a 38-15 score at the three-quarter mark. The Eagles tried to rally in the fourth quarter, as they outscored the Falcons 14-2, but this was not enough to unseat the Falcons, who gained a 40-29 win. John Schulle and Jeff Murphy shared scoring honors for Vienna with

Without Install, the Falcon's center could do as he pleased and generally controlled the game. Coach Parker also complained about the officiating, which he said was monstrously partial to Blair Oaks. Coach Parker said that the officiating was the worst case of partiality he had ever seen.

The Vienna Junior High team traveled to Belle to play in the Belle Invitational Tournament on Monday night, January 24. Vienna played Cuba. It was not a good night for Vienna. Vienna lost 56-6.

Vienna lost the game very early, as they were outscored 18-1 in the first quarter and 16-0 in the second quarter to fall to a ghastly 34-1 halftime deficit. They were outscored 12-3 in the third quarter and 12-2 in the fourth quarter to go down to a rather distressing 56-6 defeat. Vienna's coach Jim Parker had plenty of praise for both teams, and said that Cuba's junior high team was as tall as a lot of high schools' teams. ## EAGLES VS. EAGLES-SPLIT DECISION

Tuesday evening, January 18, the Vienna Eagles hosted the Eagles of Eugene in an MMC Conference contest here and gained a split decision, losing the B game 35-33 and winning the A game 61-48.

In the A game, the Eagles were able to pull away easily from the Eugene team, by outscoring them 15-5 in the first quarter and 12-6 in the second quarter to grab a 16-point halftime lead, 27-11. Vienna slipped a little in the third quarter as Eugene pushed the nets for 23 points while allowing only 18 for Vienna. Vienna gained 2 points on the Eagles in the fourth quarter, 16-14, to take the final 61-48 decision. Dave Fick led the Eagles with 11 points, followed by Tommy Williams' 14, Roger Bullock's 11, and Randy Roaden's 10. Danny Morrow led all scorers with 22 points for Eugene, all of which came in the second half. Ronnie Fox also helped out with 14 points for the losers. The Eagles had previously beaten Eugene 51-27 in the MMC Conference Tournament, 51-27, and so far this year Eugene has only managed to win one game. This win raises the Eagles conference record to a healthy 4-1, and their overall record to 9-7. This is the A team's 5th straight victory. The Eagles' next game will be with Salem in the St. James Invitational Tournament, which will be played in St. James January 24-29.

The Eugene B team came out with a close 35-33 win over Vienna's B team. Vienna came out with a hot first quarter, outscoring Eugene 1-2. However, substitutions in the second quarter affected the Eagles as they were outscored 13-10, but they still held an advantage at halftime, 19-15. Vienna fell apart in the third quarter, and was outscored 13-7, to fall behind 28-26 after three quarters of play. Neither team outscored the other in the fourth quarter as both teams scored 7 points, and Vienna went down to a 33-35 defeat. Steve Meyer paced the B team with 11 points. This broke the B team's string of 4 straight wins, and lowered their conference record to 7-2, and their overall record to 5-4.

## VIENNA FRESH JAME HAD A WILD CAT

The Vienna Junior High and Freshman teams hosted the Linn Wildcats Monday night, January 17, and emerged with a split decision, with the Junior High winning 29-22, and the Freshmen losing a close one, 39-36.

The Junior High Eagles started out the game on a sour note, falling behind 5-4 after the first quarter. The Eagles came back in the second quarter and scored 12 points to Linn's 4, to take a 16-9 halftime advantage. Linn was unable to advance on Vienna as both teams scored 13 points in the second half, and Vienna came out with a 29-22 victory. Mark Fleischmann paced Vienna with 11 points. A slow first half was fatal to the Freshmen, being outscored 9-3 in the first quarter and 15-7 in the second quarter to fall behind 24-10 at the half. In the second half, the Eagles put on a great rally, outscoring the Wildcats 18-6 in the third quarter to close the gap to 30-28, a lead of only 2 points for Linn, which led at one time by 14. In the fourth quarter, the Eagles tied the score several times, but never managed to go ahead. When time ran out, they were behind 39-36. Mickey Byrd led Vienna with 14 points, while Jim Fuller came on with 10 points.

This was the last Freshman game of the season, and Coach Parker had said they had a good season, coming out with a 3-3 record. He had a few comments about this game, again saying that the loss of Mark Junstall was critical. He pointed out that Vienna has lost two games in a row since Junstall moved to Dixon. He also said that if the Eagles would have played as well in the first half as they did in the second half, they would have won easily.

A five-game winning streak fell by the wayside as Vienna succumbed to a hot-shooting Salem team, 59-42, in the first round of the St. James Invitational Tournament held Tuesday night, January 25, in St. James. The Salem team hit on 29 of 43 attempts from the field, a very good 56% average. Salem was also a very well-disciplined team and made very few mistakes. Vienna was also outsize, as Salem is a Class L school and Vienna is an M.

Vienna kept the game close through the first quarter, and trailed by 3 points, 9-6. However, they were badly outscored in the second quarter, 18-8, to slip to a 27-14 halftime deficit. They only managed to stay even with Salem in the second half, and gave up the final margin of 17 points by 59-42.

Vienna was paced by Tommy Williams' 14 points, while Roger Buylock and Randy Rowden each added 10. Stanley Triplett tossed in 16 points for Salem.

This was the Eagles' first loss since December 17, and since then they have won 5 straight games. Their record now goes to 9-8. However, Vienna will return to St. James on Tuesday of next week to play non-conference A&B games.

## Candle Making

Many years ago candles were the only means of lighting. Before the time of Christ, crude candles were used. They were made of fats wrapped in husks or moss.

To make a candle back in the olden days, all one had to do was get a candle mold, place the wick on the inside and melt the tallow or bees-wax and pour it into the mold. After the wax cooled, it was taken out of the mold, and the candle was finished.

Modern candles are made of stearin, obtained from tallow and the mineral wax parafin. The wick, made of woven cord, is then dipped many times into this melted parafin or stearin. After this is completed the wick is put into the candle mold and the melted wax is poured around it.

Another modern method of making candles is a number of tubelike candle molds sealed in metal tanks. A wick is run from a spool through a piston and made the length of the mold. When wax has filled the molds, cold water runs into the tank and cools and hardens the wax. Then the candle is cool enough, pistons push the candles out the molds.

Anyone can make a candle if he has some parafin, something to use for a wick and a candle mold.
