The proposed sewer system for Vienna will be a giant step backward. The voters of municipal Vienna recently approved, in a miraculous unanimous vote, 186-0, to sell bonds to finance the sewer system. Perhaps the people of Vienna should look before they leap. Probably only a few of Vienna's citizens know what the building of the sewer system entails. Three lagoons will be built, to hold sewage in different stages of purification. All Vienna's sewage will be piped through a system of pipes to these lagoons. Anyone who has seen the lagoon at Marie's R-1 High School knows that it is an eyesore, and foul-smelling. These lagoons will have to be relatively close to the city, since it would be financially unfeasible to pipe the sewage very far. Aside from the problem of the lagoons, what problems will the laying of the pipes cause? Who can tell what indelible scars might be left of Vienna's landscape by the heavy construction? The third major problem will be that of the upkeep and repair of the sewer system. Or will, with the budget stretched as tight as it is now, the city be able to afford to repair and maintain the system without cutting off some other needed operation. LIVING IN A CRACKERBOX

I, and many others I suppose, live in a trailer-house. I guess there are many advantages to a trailer as long as you don't have to live in it. After giving the matter much thought, the only advantage of living in a trailer house would be that you could haul it around with you (providing you had a twelve ton truck.) If I wanted to list all the disadvantages, it would take the rest of this paper so I will just list the major ones. TWO STATES CLOSE DEATH ROW*

For the first time, high courts in two states have declared the death penalty unconstitutional. The supreme court of California, interpreting a section of the state constitution, decided six to one that execution is cruel and unusual punishment that is "unnecessary to any legitimate goal of the state and...incompatible with the dignity of man and the judicial process."

Also by a six-to-one vote, the New Jersey supreme court struck down that state's death penalty, because it coerced defendants in capital cases to incriminate themselves by pleading guilty rather than risk a jury trial in which they could be sentenced to the electric chair. Neither court based its ruling on the cruel-and-unusual-punishment prohibition in the Federal Constitution, which is being considered by the United States Supreme Court in other cases challenging the constitutionality of all death penalties.

IF YOU CAN'T LICK 'EM...*

Oklahoma City...Some members of the state's house of representatives, supporting a measure to give adult rights to 18-year-olds, were irked when prohibitionists managed to amend the bill to exclude beer-drinking privileges. So they went the anti-beer forces one better and amended the bill to raise the drinking age to 40. "This is a frivolous amendment and should be thrown out," said one member of the house; but between the protest votes and the anti-beer votes, the amendment was passed and sent to a committee, which decided that 18 was not too young for beer drinking after all.

KEEP THE POWER ON

In my opinion, capital punishment is a must in a society where murder, rape, kidnapping, and armed robbery are prevalent. And with the states of California and New Jersey joining the nine other states that have abolished the death penalty, the American penal system has taken another big step backwards. California alone had 105* convicted prisoners on death-row when that state's supreme court declared it unconstitutional. In the United States today there are 577* prisoners facing the death penalty. In Missouri alone seventeen prisoners have been sentenced to execution in the state's gas chamber, but it is doubtful whether these men will pay their debt to society since it has been more than four years since anyone in the United States has been put to death.

Those who are for the abolition of capital punishment argue that it is unconstitutional, because it violates provisions that guarantee Americans against cruel and unusual punishment and against the deprivation of life, liberty or property without due process of the law; that it is barbaric and an act of savagery; and that it discriminates against the poor and the black. But it seems to me that by committing crimes that have deprived someone else of their constitutional rights, they have placed their own citizenship in jeopardy, and have thus deprived themselves of their constitutional rights. And to call the electric chair barbaric and an act of savagery is nonsense (to my knowledge no one that has been executed by the electric chair has complained about the pain and inhuman cruelty). And when people say that it is discriminatory, they are forgetting that this form of punishment is a punishment of necessity and is made available to the states for the protection of society. And has anyone considered how much the death penalty is a detriment to crime? If people could go around and do bodily harm to another human and get away with a life sentence that can be repealed in seven years, isn't he more likely to take this action than if a possible sentence of death by execution were legal?

BREEDS OF BEEF CATTLE
AND THEIR CHARACTERISTICS!!

ANGUS--Its color is black and its place of origin is Scotland in the north eastern counties of Aberdeen, Angus, Kincardine, and Forfar. Its distinguishing characteristics are a comparatively smooth coat of hair, a polled head, and a somewhat cylindrical body. Disqualifications are horns, scurs, or buttons red color, a noticeable amount of white above the underline, or in front of the navel or on one or more legs. Calves from females less than 18 months age when calf was dropped or from bulls less than 6 months of age at the time of service are not subject to register.

BELTED GALLOWAY--Its color is black with a blackish tinge, or dun, with a white belt completely circling the body between the shoulders and the hooks. Its origin is Scotland, in the southwestern district of Galloway. Its distinguishing characteristics are a heavy coat of hair and a polled head. Disqualifications are red color, incomplete belt, other white marks or scurs.

BRAHMAN--Its color is grey or red preferred; either solid color or a gradual blending color of the two. However there are brown, black, white and spotted Brahmans. Its origin is India but a distinct American breed has been created through the amalgamation of several Indian types, probably with a small hump over the shoulders, and the dewlap, drooping ears and a long face, a voice that resembles a grunt rather than a low. Disqualifications include brindie, smutty blackish red, or a n albino color, cryptorchid bull freemartin heifer, inherited lameless, dwarf or midget characteristics.

CHAROLAIS--Its color is white or cream. Its origin is France. In the province of Charlasse in central France. Distinguishing characteristics are pink skin and mucous membranes and a horned head. Disqualifications are a black nose, spotted or excessive dark skin pigmentation.

DEVON--Its color is black or red. Its origin is Ireland in the so southern and southwestern parts. They were named after for their founder, a Mr. Devon. Its distinguishing characteristics are small size and short legs. Mature bulls should not exceed 900 lbs. and mature cows 800 lbs. Some mature animals are less than 40 inches high. Disqualifications are animals having white other than on the belly, thighs, udder, or scrotum are disqualified for registry.

GALLOWAY--Its color is black sometimes with a brownish or reddish tint or dun. Its origin is Scotland in the southwestern province of Galloway. Its disqualification features are white markings on their legs or above the under line.

HEREFORD--Its color is red with white markings, white face and white on the underline, flank, great switch, breast and below the knees and hocks. White back of the crops, high on the flanks, or too high on the legs is objectionable. Likewise, dark or smutty noses and red nicks are frowned upon. Its disqualification features are calves from females less than 24 months of age when calf is

dropped or from a bull less than 12 months of age when service producing the calf delivered cannot be registered.

INDU BRAZIL-(ZEBO)- Its color is light grey to silver grey, on to red. Its origin is Brazil; its distinguishing characteristics are a prominent lump over the shoulders, and above loose, pendulous skin under the throat and along the dewlap, a prominent forehead and long droopiness. Symmetrical horns curving upward and to the rear. Its disqualifications are brindle color combinations, white, markings on the nose, or switch. Absence of loose thick, mellow skin, weak and improperly formed hump.

POLLED HEREFORDS- Its color is the same as the hereford. Its origin is the U.S. in Iowa. Its disqualifications are horns. No calf eligible for registration unless its sire was a least 12 months of age at the time of conception and its dam at least 24 months age at time of calving.

POLLED SHORTHORN-Its color red, white, or any combination of red and white. A smooty nose or dark nose is objective. Its origin is north central states chiefly Ohio and Indiana. Its disqualifications are horned animals.

SCOTCH HIGHLAND-Its color is silver, golden, light red, brindle, black and brown. Its origin is Scotland. Its distinguishing characteristic are long shaggy hair shorthead of legs. Its also has long widespread horns and heavy foretop. Its disqualifications are mottled or spotted with white (white permissible on top of tail or on udder, or polle.)

SHORT HORN-Its color is the same as polled shorthorn. Its origin is England. In the northwestern counties of Durham, Northumberland, York and Lincoln. Its distinguishing characteristics are rather short, refined incurving horns. Its disqualifications are no calf is eligible for registration unless it is sire and dam were each at least 18 months of age at the birth of the calf.

EAGLE TRACKMEN SWEEP THIRD MEET OF YEAR AGAINST IBERIA

Iberia proved not to be much competition for Vienna's power-packed track team on Tuesday as the Eagles flew away with a track meet on their own track. Vienna won the afternoon competition by a composite score of 107-20.

Vienna took first place in 14 of the 15 events, with a tie in the remaining one. Junior Jerry Havens was a bright spot for Vienna, taking four first places, in the high jump, discus, shot put, and 60-yd. high hurdles.

The first event of the day was the discus, won by Havens with a throw of 111'3". Manien of Iberia was second, Tom Williams of Vienna third, and Sherrell of Iberia fourth. The shot put was won by Havens with a heave of 37'7". Dave Fick of Vienna finished second, Sherrell of Iberia was third, Bill Vogt of Vienna fourth and Veach of Iberia fifth.

Vienna took first place in the pole vault on an 8'7" performance by Tom Williams. Jones of Iberia came in second, David Roberds of Vienna third, and Meyer of Iberia fourth. Jerry Havens also took first place in the high jump with a jump of 5'2". Completing a one-two-three sweep for Vienna was Rick Stratman second, and David Roberds third. The three Iberia entrants failed to clear the starting height. David Fick of Vienna took first in the long jump with a leap of 19'½" while Danny Kleffner of Vienna finished second with Sherrell, Baker, and Vandegriff, all of Iberia, finishing third, fourth, and fifth.

In the relays, Vienna took first in the mile relay with a time of 4:01.6. The mile relay was Vic Stratman, Rick Stratman, Tom Williams, and Dave Fick.

VIENNA TRACK TEAM SMASHED SCHOOL RECORDS

Three school records were smashed and one was tied as Vienna's track team competed in the ideal conditions of Waynesville's fine track, coupled with cool weather, in the twelfth annual Waynesville Invitational TRACK meet.

A record that had stood for 10 years was broken when the 440-yd. relay team of Vic Pierce, Vic Stratman, Danny Kleffner and Dave Fick turned in a 46.7 sec. time, almost two seconds better than the 48.6 seconds which was established by Ken Bassett, Bob Ragan, Jim Volmert, and Dean Ready in 1962.

The Eagles tied the record in the 2-mile relay with a time of 8:40.2. The relay team was composed of Vic Stratman, Gary Fleischmann, Leonard Ewers, and Rick Stratman. The record, which was 11 years old, is also held by the team of Douglas Parker, Dwight Parker, Danny Wansing, and Billy Howser. A high spot in Vienna's relay was the performance of Vic Stratman, who ran a 2:03.2 time in his leg of the relay. This time, if ran in the open 880, would have established a new school record.

The third and most coveted record to fall was the 880-yd. relay record, which was run by the same crew which broke the 440-yd. relay record. The time of Vic Stratman, Vic Pierce, Danny Kleffner, and Dave Fick was 1:35.4, more than two seconds under the previous record. The former record of 1:37.7 was established in 1961 by Roy Hager, Dean Ready, Jim Volmert, and Ken Bassett.

Also broken was the record in the two-mile run, formerly held by Mike Wansing in 11:31. Mike Renkemeyer put that one away, running it in 11:07, more than a minute under his best personal run ever. Wesley Honse also ran under the school record, but not good enough to beat Renkemeyer.

In overall team standings, Vienna fared poorly, for they were outclassed by the large class I schools such as Waynesville which attended the meet. However, the 880-yd. relay time was good enough for third in that event. The 440-yd. relay team captured fourth, as did the two-mile relay team. Vic Pierce finished fifth in the 220-yd. run, with a time of 23.4 in the preliminaries. Albert Weidinger ran his best mile run ever, getting under five minutes for the first time ever at 4:54, good enough for fifth. Vienna's highest placement came in the broad jump, where Danny Kleffner took second with a leap of 19'5½", the best jump by a Vienna track man this year.

A FEW BASKETBALL RECORDS:

Vienna's basketball records are not kept as completely as the track records, but here are a few of them.

Louis Sandbothe holds the record for the most points scored in a game, 55, along with the most career points, and most career rebounds, and most rebounds and points in one season. He also holds the record for ~~most points per game~~ highest average in a season, around 30 points per game.

The team that Sandbothe played on, along with college-star-to-be Bill Parker, was the winningest team in Vienna's history, finishing up the season with a mark of 32-4. They won their regional but lost to Troy in the first round of the State Championship Basketball Tournament.

Two All-Staters Basketball Players have played for Vienna. They were Louis Sandbothe, who was All-State during his junior and senior years, and Coach Bill Hodge, who was also an all-state basketball selection for his last two years of high school.

VIENNA BOYS' TRACK TEAM WINS OMMC CONFERENCE

The Vienna boys' track team ran away with their most important track meet of the year on Tuesday when they won their 11th consecutive OMMC Conference Track Championship on Tuesday, outscoring their nearest opponent by 70 points. The scores of the track meet held Vienna with 117½, Russellville second with 47½, Fatima third with 41½, Chamois fourth with 24½, and Linn fifth with 9. Vienna broke three conference records, in the 100 yd. Dash, the Mile Relay, and the Two-Mile Relay. Junior Jerry Havens captured the spotlight by taking three first places and one second place.

The Pole Vault ended up a tie between Tom Williams and Danny Davis, both of Vienna, who were the only entrants. The High Jump was won by Jerry Havens of Vienna, with a jump of 5'7". He was followed by Baker and Mekim, both of Iberia. continued

EASTER ISLAND

Easter Island lies in the south Pacific about 2,400 miles west of Chile. The island is governed by Chile. Easter Island is of volcanic origin. Its area is 63 square miles. The principal volcano rises about 1,400 feet. Weathered lava supports grasses on which the Chilean navy grazes sheep. Much of the coast is steep, with no reefs and only one sandy beach.

The Dutch admiral Roggeveen discovered Easter Island on Easter Island, 1722. Archalologists agree that three different cultural ages flourished on the island before the arrival of the Europeans. By 400 AD, an elaborate defense position had been built by people who specialized in making small stone statues and neatly fitted masonry of large stones. A later civilization destroyed these constructions and rebuilt them to form ahus (raised temple platforms). Gigantic stone busts in human form were erected on the ahus. During this period, more than 600 large stone statues were carved from hard volcanic rock in the crater walls of the volcano Rona Raraka. The sculptors used stone hand picks made of basalt. Some of the statues measured 30 to 40 feet tall.

The ancestors of the present polynesian population conquered the island about 1670 and massacred its inhabitants. A period of decline followed, lasting until the 1860's. During this period, the statues on the ahus were overthrown. Cannibalism was practiced. Many people abandoned their grass houses and lived in underground caves where they stored their treasures. Early missionaries found a number of wooden tablets covered by rows of a kind of script. The inhabitants could not explain the script. About 20 such boards are preserved today in museum collections.

At the time of discovery, the Easter Islanders ate chiefly fish and sweet potatoes. Now they depend on supplies brought by the Chilean navy.
